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SUMMARY:

18 19 The Temporary Traffic Controls Technical Committee recommends a clarification for the use of Temporary Portable Rumble Strips within a Temporary Traffic Control zone by adding an additional sentence as new Paragraph 06, Section 6F.87, Rumble Strips.

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DISCUSSION

- 23 The use of Temporary Portable Rumble Strips (TPRS) within Temporary Traffic Control (TTC)
- 24 zones is an incorporation of new technology that was not available during the review process for
- 25 the 2009 Manual. These devices are now used in many states, and have been incorporated into 26
- their standards for work zones. The TTCTC recommends that there be a clarification added as a 27 new Paragraph 06 in Section 6F.87, Rumble Strips, to specifically note that the use of the TPRS
- 28 is an allowable option. The existing Paragraphs 06 to 11 will be renumbered as Paragraphs 07
- 29 to 12. This proposed addition is shown in the proposed Section 6F.87, Rumble Strips.

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RECOMMENDED MUTCD CHANGES

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Part 6. TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL

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Chapter 6F. TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL ZONE DEVICES

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Section 6F.87 Rumble Strips

45 Support:

- Transverse rumble strips consist of intermittent, narrow, transverse areas of rough-textured or slightly raised or depressed road surface that extend across the travel lanes to alert drivers to unusual vehicular traffic conditions. Through noise and vibration, they attract the driver's attention to such features as unexpected changes in alignment and to conditions requiring a stop.
- 50 Longitudinal rumble strips consist of a series of rough-textured or slightly raised or depressed road surfaces located along the shoulder to alert road users that they are leaving the travel lanes.
- 52 Standard:
- 53 of If it is desirable to use a color other than the color of the pavement for a longitudinal rumble strip, the color of the rumble strip shall be the same color as the longitudinal line the rumble strip supplements.
- 56 04 If the color of a transverse rumble strip used within a travel lane is not the color of the pavement, the color of the rumble strip shall be white, black, or orange.
- 58 Option:
 - os Intervals between transverse rumble strips may be reduced as the distance to the approached conditions is diminished in order to convey an impression that a closure speed is too fast and/or that an action is imminent. A sign warning drivers of the onset of rumble strips may be placed in advance of any transverse rumble strip installation.
 - <u>05a</u> Portable transverse rumble strips may be placed with in the temporary traffic control zone to alert road users to changes road conditions.

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Guidance:

- 06 Transverse rumble strips should be placed transverse to vehicular traffic movement. They should not adversely affect overall pavement skid resistance under wet or dry conditions.
- 69 07 In urban areas, even though a closer spacing might be warranted, transverse rumble strips should be designed in a manner that does not promote unnecessary braking or erratic steering maneuvers by road users.
- 72 08 Transverse rumble strips should not be placed on sharp horizontal or vertical curves.
- 73 09 Rumble strips should not be placed through pedestrian crossings or on bicycle routes.

- 74 11 Transverse rumble strips should not be placed on roadways used by bicyclists unless a minimum
- 75 clear path of 4 feet is provided at each edge of the roadway or on each paved shoulder as described in
- 76 AASHTO's "Guide to the Development of Bicycle Facilities" (see Section 1A.11).
- 77 12 Longitudinal rumble strips should not be placed on the shoulder of a roadway that is used by
- bicyclists unless a minimum clear path of 4 feet is also provided on the shoulder.
